- Judges in NC hear cases related to abortion access. Are you pro-choice? How would you respond to those types of cases. Judges are bound by our Judicial Code of Conduct to not give opinions on matters that may appear before them. The current law in our state allows abortion up to 12 weeks into pregnancy with exceptions after 12 weeks for rape, incest, and health of the mother as well as in the case of fetal anomalies.
